

## <u>Domestic Mobile Terminating Access Service (MTAS) Declaration inquiry</u> <u>Report of the ACCC's Draft Decision</u>

- Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Report of the ACCC's Draft Decision on the Domestic Mobile Terminating Access Service (MTAS) Declaration Inquiry, dated 13 December 2013.
- 2) AAPT welcomes and agrees with the ACCC's preliminary view that the declaration of the domestic MTAS should be extended for five years.
- 3) Although AAPT is disappointed with the ACCC's decision not to proactively conduct an inquiry into the declaration of a mobile originating access service (MOAS) at this time, AAPT is encouraged by the ACCC's statement that it will continue to monitor the proposed freephone and local rate numbers arrangements. In this respect, AAPT notes the following:
  - a) commercial negotiations are currently taking place within industry to agree new MOAS rates in light of the impending implementation of the freephone and local rate numbers arrangements;
  - there is currently difficulty in reaching agreed commercial outcomes given the differing commercial motivations of mobile network operators, integrated fixed network providers and non-integrated fixed network providers (as set out in AAPT's submission in response to the initial MTAS declaration review discussion paper); and
  - c) any form of guidance from the ACCC as to the pricing of the MOAS is likely to incentivise and facilitate parties reaching agreement.
