- providing information through its working groups to businesses about some of the steps that can be taken to mitigate harm and prevent scams; and
- continuing to explore and discuss with the ACMA, how initiatives such as the proposed SMS Sender Id Registry can protect consumers from these scams.



Key points

Scamwatch HSBC reports and trends

- In 2023 Scamwatch received over 6,800 reports of bank impersonation scams, resulting in losses of about \$18 million.
- Between 1 July 2023 and 29 February 2024, Scamwatch received 422 reports about HSBC bank impersonation scams, with \$6.3 million in reported losses.
- Since February 2024, after the National Anti-Scam Centre issued a scam alert, reports to Scamwatch relating to HSBC impersonation scams have continued, importantly not all these

reports are of scams occurring in February – some of these instances occurred prior to the scam alert and the report may well have been prompted by the scam alert:

	No. of reports	Reported losses
5/2/24 - 11/2/24	23	\$166,268.31
12/2/24 – 18/2/24	20	\$235,790
19/2/24 – 25/2/24	17	\$744,299.99
26/2/24 – 3/3/24	9	\$54,000

NB: There was a significant spike in losses in the week commencing 19 February 2024. These can be attributed to some high loss reports (1x\$250K, 3x\$100K, 1x\$95K, and 1x\$50K) which have not yet been checked against AUSTRAC but appear legitimate.

 The National Anti-Scam Centre Regulatory Steering Group (Commissioner-level representatives from ACCC, ASIC and the ACMA) discussed HSBC impersonation scams at their meeting on 23 February 2023.

- The National Anti-Scam Centre has continued to monitor reports and sent disseminations
 containing the phone numbers being used to telecommunications providers and ACMA on 8 March
 as well as information to law enforcement about the scam.
