As has been brought to my attention the government is planning to cap nursing agency wages for those nurses who plan to work in the public system as agency nurses. I am well aware of the current crisis that faces the health industry not only in Victoria but Australia wide. As a nurse who currently works part time and agency I am not entirely against the notion and believe it is more likely to bring nurses back to the permanent work force. However I do not agree with the government's underhanded idea of pushing this legislation through without bringing it to the attention of the majority poulation it will be affecting.
