Virgin Australia and Skywest Airlines (Australia) Pty Ltd applications for authorisation A91287 and A91288 - interested party consultation

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (the ACCC) has received applications for authorisation from Virgin Australia and Skywest Airlines (Australia) Pty Ltd (Skywest). The ACCC invites you to comment on the applications. Attached is a summary of the authorisation process including how to make a submission to the ACCC.

Virgin Australia and Skywest are seeking authorisation to make, and give effect to, a Corporate Alliance Framework Agreement, Frequent Flyer and Lounge Agreement and Joint Sales Agreement (together the Corporate Alliance) for the provision of commercial passenger airline services to corporate customers.

Under the Corporate Alliance, the applicants will jointly market to, tender for, and contract with, corporate customers. The Corporate Alliance will be limited to tenders and contracts for corporate customers that involve a suite of services including both chartered and regular scheduled air services (known as 'regular public transport' or RPT air services). The cooperation will extend to the applicants' RPT services to the extent that these services form part of an integrated offer to be supplied to corporate customers.

A full copy of the application for authorisation, including a full description of the applicants and their proposed alliance, is available on the ACCC's website <www.accc.gov.au/AuthorisationsRegister>.

Interim authorisation

Virgin Australia and Skywest have also requested *interim* authorisation for their Corporate Alliance pending the outcome of the ACCC's final decision on authorisation. The applicants seek interim authorisation to implement the Corporate Alliance in early 2012. They submit

that this would enable them to begin marketing an integrated offer and be ready to respond to corporate tenders from that time onwards.

The ACCC endeavours to deal with requests for interim authorisation quickly. In making an assessment as to whether it is appropriate to grant interim authorisation, the ACCC is not required to undertake a full assessment of the benefit and detriment likely to arise as a result of the proposed conduct. Nevertheless, submissions in relation to interim authorisation are invited in this matter.

The ACCC decides whether to grant interim authorisation on a case by case basis. Should an applicant request interim authorisation, the ACCC will usually consider a range of factors, including harm to the applicant and other parties if interim authorisation is or is not granted, possible benefit and detriment to the public, the urgency of the matter and whether the market would be able to return to substantially its pre-interim authorisation state if the ACCC should later deny authorisation.

Request for submissions

The ACCC invites you to make a submission on the likely public benefits and effect on competition, or any other public detriment, from the proposed arrangements. Submissions are invited both in relation to the application for authorisation and in relation to the application for interim authorisation. In particular the ACCC would appreciate your views on the following issues:

- the impact that the Corporate Alliance is likely to have on competition in Australia for the provision of charter and RPT air services
- the likely public benefits and of the proposed Corporate Alliance
- the likely public detriments of the proposed Corporate Alliance
- the impact on the relevant market(s) if the applicants were to implement the Corporate Alliance under a grant of interim authorisation.

If you intend to provide a submission in relation to the applications for authorisation, please do so by 27 January 2012. Any submissions in relation to interim authorisation should be provided by 9 January 2012.

Submissions, including oral submissions, will be placed on the ACCC's public register subject to any request for exclusion (guidelines are attached).

Timetable

The ACCC will progress its assessment of the application in a timely manner. An indicative timetable is set out below for your information.

9 December 2011	Applicants provide revised public register version of supporting submission.
16 December 2011	Public consultation process begins.
9 January 2012	Closing date for submissions on interim authorisation.
January/February 2012	ACCC decision regarding interim authorisation.
27 January 2012	Closing date for submissions from interested parties on authorisation.
3 February 2012	Applicants respond to issues raised in the public consultation process.
March/April 2012	Draft determination.
April 2012	Public consultation on draft determination including any conference if called.
May/June 2012	Final determination.
