Emirates and Flydubai applications for authorisation A91298 and A91299 – interested party consultation

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (the ACCC) has received applications for authorisation from Emirates and Dubai Aviation Corporation (trading as Flydubai), and invites you to comment on the applications. Attached is a summary of the authorisation process including how to make a submission to the ACCC.

Broadly, Emirates and Flydubai are seeking authorisation to coordinate operations on international air transportation and air cargo services through an Affiliation Agreement.

Interim authorisation

Emirates and Flydubai have also requested *interim* authorisation for their Affiliation Agreement pending the outcome of the ACCC's final decision on authorisation. The applicants seek interim authorisation to implement the Affiliation Agreement as soon as possible. They submit that this would enable them to begin marketing an integrated offer.

The ACCC endeavours to deal with requests for interim authorisation quickly. In deciding whether to grant interim authorisation, the ACCC is not required to undertake a full assessment of the benefit and detriment likely to arise as a result of the proposed conduct. Nevertheless, submissions in relation to interim authorisation are invited in this matter.

The ACCC decides whether to grant interim authorisation on a case by case basis and may take into account a range of factors, including harm to the applicant and other parties if interim authorisation is or is not granted, possible benefit and detriment to the public, the urgency of the matter and whether the market would be able to return to substantially its preinterim authorisation state if the ACCC should later deny authorisation.

Submissions

The ACCC invites you to make a submission on the likely public benefits and effect on competition, or any other public detriment, from the proposed arrangements. Submissions are invited both in relation to the application for authorisation and in relation to the application for interim authorisation.

If you intend to provide a submission in relation to the applications for authorisation, please do so by 24 May 2012. Any submissions in relation to interim authorisation should be provided by 10 May 2012.

Submissions, including oral submissions, will be placed on the ACCC's public register subject to any request for exclusion (guidelines are attached).

Timetable

The ACCC will progress its assessment of the application in a timely manner. An indicative timetable is set out below for your information.

23 April 2012	Lodgement of application and supporting submission.
3 May 2012	Public consultation process begins.
10 May 2012	Closing date for submissions on interim authorisation
May 2012	ACCC decision regarding interim authorisation.
24 May 2012	Closing date for submissions from interested parties on authorisation.
1 June 2012	Applicants respond to issues raised in the public consultation process.
June/July	Draft determination.
July 2012	Public consultation on draft determination including any conference if called.
August/September 2012	Final determination.

You can also forward this letter to any other party who may wish to make a submission to the ACCC regarding the applications.
