Re: Request for submissions: OneFortyOne Plantations Holdings Pty Ltd's proposed acquisition of Global Forest Partners LP's softwood plantation assets (Green Triangle Forest Products)

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (**ACCC**) is seeking your views on the proposed acquisition of Green Triangle Forest Products (**GTFP**) by OneFortyOne Plantations Holdings Pty Ltd (**OFO**) (the **proposed acquisition**).

OFO is an integrated timber company, being both a forest grower and owning a structural sawmill in the Green Triangle region. GTFP is a forest grower and is currently owned by investors managed by Global Forest Partners LP. Further details regarding the proposed acquisition can be found at **Attachment A**.

The ACCC's investigation is focused on the impact on competition. In particular, we are seeking your views on:

- the impact of the proposed acquisition on the prices for softwood fibre products in the Green Triangle region (encompassing Western Victoria);
- whether OFO and GTFP compete closely; and
- whether OFO would be able to:
 - restrict the supply of its softwood fibre products to rival sawmills for processing; or
 - refuse to process rival forest growers' softwood fibre products and therefore restrict their ability to supply sawmill customers.

Further issues you may wish to address are set out in **Attachment B**.

This matter is public and you can forward this letter to anybody who may be interested. The ACCC is also considering a proposal by New Forests Asset Management Pty Ltd to acquire Global Forest Partners LP's softwood plantation assets. More information is

available on the ACCC's public mergers register (link).

The legal test which the ACCC applies in considering the proposed acquisition is in section 50 of the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010*. Section 50 prohibits acquisitions that are likely to have the effect of substantially lessening competition in a market.

Information about the merger parties and the proposed acquisition

The proposed acquisition

OneFortyOne Plantations Holdings Pty Ltd (**OFO**) proposes to acquire 100% of the units in World Timberfund Australia Trust, which owns the business known as Green Triangle Forest Products (**GTFP**), from investors managed by Global Forest Partners LP (**GFP**).

The Green Triangle region spans the border between South Australia and Victoria and consists of two types of plantations, softwood and hardwood estates. The GTFP estate consists of softwood plantations spread throughout the Green Triangle region in Tarpeena, Cafpirco, Kongorong, Caroline, Kentbruck and Dartmoor. The estate comprises a total productive area of about 22,200 hectares.

The types of softwood products produced by forest growers include sawlogs (used in timber production), round wood logs (used to manufacture posts and poles), pulplogs, and woodchips (used to manufacture particleboard and paper).

OFO

OFO is an integrated timber company that is majority owned by Australian funds and operates across both Australia and New Zealand. It is the largest of the Green Triangle forest growers, leasing the long-term harvesting rights to a softwood plantation estate from the South Australian Government. OFO's plantation estate sits across both South Australia and Victoria and comprises a total productive area of approximately 83,000 hectares.

OFO owns the Jubilee Highway Sawmill (**Jubilee**) in Mount Gambier, which is a structural sawmill that produces timber products for customers across Australia. GTFP currently supplies Jubilee with a significant proportion of Jubilee's sawlog requirements under a long-term agreement.

GTFP and GFP

GTFP is the smallest of the large Green Triangle forest growers. The majority of GTFP's sawlogs are already committed to OFO's Jubilee.

GFP is a US-based forestry investment adviser that manages approximately US\$3 billion in forestry assets and 700,000 hectares of timberland worldwide, including in Australia where it has been active since 1999. GFP manages approximately 266,500 hectares of timberland in Australia.¹
