Request for submissions: Qantas' proposed acquisition of Alliance Airlines

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (**ACCC**) is seeking your views on Qantas Airways Ltd's (**Qantas**) proposed acquisition of the remaining shares in Alliance Aviation Services Ltd (**Alliance Airlines**) that it does not already own (the **proposed acquisition**).

Alliance Airlines predominantly provides charter services to corporate customers. It also leases aircraft to airline clients and supplies other associated aviation services including spare parts, aircraft maintenance and engineering services.

The Qantas Group also operates charter services in addition to its domestic and international regular passenger transport (RPT) services. Further details regarding the proposed acquisition can be found at **Attachment A.**

The ACCC's investigation is focused on the impact on competition. In particular, we are seeking your views on:

- how closely Qantas and Alliance Airlines compete in the supply of charter and/or RPT services
- whether there are sufficient alternative suppliers to maintain competition
- the impact of the proposed acquisition on price, quality or service levels for charter and/or RPT services, and
- the impact if Alliance were to cease providing aircraft leasing or associated aviation services to other airlines after the proposed acquisition.

Further issues you may wish to address are set out in Attachment B.

This matter is public and you can forward this letter to anybody who may be interested.

The legal test which the ACCC applies in considering the acquisition is in section 50 of the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010.* Section 50 prohibits acquisitions that are likely to have the effect of substantially lessening competition in a market.

Attachment A

Qantas

Qantas is an Australian based airline which operates both domestic and international flights. Qantas provides RPT services across all Australian states and territories, as well as charter services in Western Australia and Queensland.

Qantas Airways Ltd is listed on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX:QAN). Its subsidiaries include: Jetstar (which operates domestic and international flights), QantasLink (a regional airline), and Network Aviation (a charter services and regional airline based in WA).

Alliance Airlines

Alliance Airlines is an aviation services company specialising in the provision of charter services to corporate customers. It also leases aircraft to other airlines, and supplies other associated aviation services including the sale and leasing of spare parts and replacement engines, plus inhouse maintenance and engineering services.

As part of its charter services, Alliance Airlines also incidentally supplies a limited number of seats to the public on five of its charter routes: Adelaide-Olympic Dam, Perth-Kalgoorlie, Brisbane-Weipa, Cairns-Weipa and Cairns-Groote Eylandt. Alliance Airlines also operates one RPT route: Brisbane-Moranbah.

Alliance Airlines has bases in Brisbane, Townsville, Cairns, Adelaide, Perth, Melbourne and Darwin, and is currently constructing a Rockhampton base.

Alliance Aviation Services Ltd, which owns Alliance Airlines, is listed on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX:AQZ).

The proposed acquisition

On 1 February 2019 Qantas announced it had acquired a 19.9 per cent holding in Alliance Aviation Services Ltd, for about \$60 million. At this time, Qantas had indicated that it wished to build on its 19.9 per cent minority shareholding to ultimately own 100 per cent of Alliance.

On 5 May 2022, Qantas announced that it had reached an agreement to acquire the remaining shares in Alliance Aviation Services Ltd that it does not already own.
